

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WHO WE ARE

OUR MISSION

The Gilbert Centre is a community-based, not-for-profit, charitable organization that has been providing programs and services for 25 years. In 2015, in part to recognize the reality of people with HIV not developing AIDS, but living healthy lives with HIV, the organization changed its name from AIDS Committee of Simcoe County to the Gilbert Centre for Social and Support Services. Our name change not only reflects the change in HIV, but also embraces the expansion of programming to service 2-spirits, lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer individuals and families, and more recently, the expansion of harm reduction programming. We take a broad, social determinants approach to our work that is based in social justice, health equity and human rights. We seek to engage individuals, families, organizations, institutions and communities as partners and collaborators in the work we undertake.

OUR COMMITMENT

Gilbert Centre commits to providing our service users, volunteers, staff and stakeholders an Annual Report highlighting our programming, successes and challenges faced, as well as the overall impact throughout the reporting year.

OUR VALUES

We operate from a value system grounded in the following key areas and based on continuously working towards improving our capacity and practices.

Queer and trans inclusion - committing to challenge systemic barriers that reduce health outcomes for vulnerable populations, particularly 2SLGBTQ individuals.

Anti-oppression practices - acting consciously and consistently to challenge systemic and historic patterns of marginalization and oppression including racism, sexism, homophobia and discrimination in all its forms.

Sex positivity - celebrating healthy sexual relationships, diversity within those relationships, bodily autonomy and empowering individuals to control their own sex life (or lack thereof).

Harm reduction - committing that people who use substances are treated with respect and without stigma and that substance related problems and issues are viewed systematically.

Decriminalization - efforts to support decriminalization related to social justice, specifically illegal substances and substance use, sex work, and reducing unjust prosecutions against people living with HIV.

World AIDS Day 2020

The Gilbert Centre for Social and Support Services marked National HIV/AIDS Awareness Week, November 23 to December 1 (World AIDS Day) with our Sixth Annual Red Scarf Campaign in Simcoe County and Muskoka regions. Donated red scarves, knitted by volunteers and friends of the Gilbert Centre were handed out to organizations throughout Simoe Muskoka. Our biggest donation of 100 scarfs went to Gravenhurst Against Poverty. A special thank you to all the volunteers for helping bring awareness to World AIDS Day while providing warmth for those in need.

inclusHIV Care Clinic Grand Opening!

The inclusHIV Care Clinic provides Point of Care HIV testing - the first of its kind in Central Ontario. The goal of the clinic is to offer broader regional health and community services to Simcoe Muskoka.

The clinic was in its final preparation stage in 2020, however due to the COVID-19 pandemic the launch was pushed back until April 21, 2021.

HARM REDUCTION

Saves Lives

With the support of the United Way Centraide Grant the Gilbert Centre was able to enhance our harm reduction outreach services in Barrie, Midland, Bracebridge and Orillia. This included having additional access to food, medical supplies, hygiene supplies, snacks, water, clothing, housing resources, temporary shelter, and referrals to much needed resources. Several people were supported into shelter, and because of the relationships built through the growth of the program, we were able to establish a few people were able to find more stable housing, either on their own or through the reunification with their families and support systems. By supporting people with hygiene and medical needs we were able to help alleviate some of the burden on our taxed hospital system by referring people to medical care before their needs became urgent. In addition, we were able to supply undervalued medical aids (such as bandaids, saline solution, antibiotic cream, etc.) so that conditions could be aided in their healing so as to not require formal medical attention at all.

COVID-19 presented new opportunities for our youth programming and one in which Gilbert Centre embraced. Our program went from weekly drop-ins (pre covid) that averaged 8-10 participants, to an online platform with access to a staff member via phone, text, in-person or email Monday to Friday from 9-6pm. Connections with the youth engaged in programming have grown stronger as more conversations are being had and there is no waiting until the next group to talk about challenges or crisis. We now receive updates daily from the youth and how they are doing. This new platform has also allowed for connetion with youth from all across the country. More friends are being made, larger support networks being developed, and participants are getting information when they need it.

Gilbert Centre and Catholic Family Services have been partnering together to provide both formal and informal counselling services to youth ages 12-20 since September 2019. We would like to thank Kim for her continued dedication to our youth and program.

SENIORS PROGRAM



New Horizons for 2S-LGBTQ+ Older Adults is a partnership between multiple agencies across central and northern Ontario, created to reduce the social isolation experienced by older (55+) 2S-LGBTQ+ people, and is especially important for these communities as they are often geographically isolated as well. Participating agencies include Gilbert Centre, Mamaway Wiidokdaadwin, AIDS Committee of North Bay and Area, North Bay Indigenous Hub, Reseau Access Network, and Ontario Aboriginal HIV/AIDS Strategy (Sudbury). This partnership has allowed for a collaborative approach to elder care, engagement, social opportunities, and accessibility. The emergence of the COVID-19 virus presented the program with a challenge that was met with a rich array of virtual programming, allowing for networking across regions, but also an increase in participant isolation and mental health challenges. The New Horizons staff, leadership and community partners have rallied to provide ongoing support to this underserved and often invisible population, resulting in a growing and successful program that is unparalleled across the country.

As with all programming, our Seniors program had to adapt through a very challenging year as COVID-19 changed the structure and layout of how our groups were run. We quickly jumped into action to continue providing social and support groups twice a week for the Simcoe/Muskoka, North Bay and Sudbury regions, virtually. We currently have 25 unique participants who take advantage of this space and the virtual platform has allowed our programming to reach and engage people across the country. Participants receive weekly updates and prorgram reminders as well. We are eager to get back to in person events as soon as we can safely do so. Until then, we continue to find creative ways to engage a population that tends to remain hidden and can be averse to learning new technology. Connection to community is key and we want to ensure that anyone needing that sense of community can access it as often as needed. Thank you to Seniors Pride Network of Toronto and Ontario Digital Literacy Access Network for providing regular educational webinars and events for our clients. These events have been incredibly successful and we look forward to seeing where these partnerships take us in the future.
